

National President Larry Pangan Dies Suddenly

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Philippine Scouts Heritage Society President Larry Pangan passed away suddenly on November 18, 2004. Larry was one of the founders of the Society and served for many years in various capacities in the Golden Gate-Bay Area Chapter and at the national level. In 2002 he became National President and held that post until his sudden passing. His stewardship was notable for the support he gave successor generation members as they began to take over leadership positions. He also was supportive of efforts by this new leadership to standardize and make more businesslike the policies and practices of the Society.

Larry was born in Arayat, Pampanga, but moved to Manila in 1938 to attend a business college. He joined the Philippine Scouts in March 1941 and was assigned to the 57th Infantry Regiment. Larry survived the Bataan Death March and incarceration at the infamous Camp O'Donnell. Although seriously ill with malaria, dysentery, beriberi and malnutrition, he was able to escape. Upon regaining his health, Larry joined an American-led guerrilla group in central Luzon. For his combat service in WWII he was awarded the Bronze Star and several other medals. He later would receive a second Bronze Star for his service in the Korean War. Larry retired from the U.S. Army in 1961 and became very active in various veterans' organizations.

Larry's wife Lucina predeceased him in 1995. He is survived by his nine children, Angelita, Esther, Manual, Ofelia, Zeniada, Rosemary, Patrick, David and Ricky, 10 grandchildren, 3 great grandchildren, and his companion of many years, Lourdes Escala.

His sudden death is a terrible loss to his family, his many friends and to all of us who came to know him over his years of service dedicated to preserving the memory and heritage of that legendary group of fighting men, the Philippine Scouts. His family has requested that, in lieu of flowers, contributions be sent to the Philippine Scouts Heritage Society.

Our Twenty-first reunion will take place at the <u>Radisson Villa Hotel in San</u> <u>Mateo on Friday and Saturday, May 27-</u> <u>28</u>. A reunion registration form is elsewhere in this newsletter.

Program highlights of the weekend will be the keynote address of the Honorable Rowena Sanchez, newly-arrived Philippine Consul General in San Francisco, and a book presentation and signing by Chris Schaefer, whose just-published <u>Bataan Diary</u> is reviewed elsewhere in this issue.

During the business meeting portion of this gathering, we will discuss how best to memorialize our two deceased National Presidents, Brigadier General Royal Reynolds, Jr. and Larry Pangan. Already over \$1,000 each has been raised for this purpose.

Book Review: Bataan Diary by Chris Schaefer

Schaefer, Chris. *Bataan Diary: An American Family in World War II, 1941-1945*. Riverview Publishing, Houston, Texas, 2004. Pp. 434, incl. 60 pp. endnotes, extensive bibliography and index, as well as 5 maps and 12 pp. of photos. ISBN: 0-9761084-0-2. SRP: \$14.95, paperback available through either www.bataandiary.com or amazon.com.

Chris Schaefer's extremely readable <u>Bataan Diary: An American Family in</u> <u>World War II, 1941-1945</u> is a well-documented story of resistance and survival during the Japanese occupation of the Philippines.

Built around the World War II diaries kept by Major Frank R. Loyd and his wife, Evelyn, the book chronicles the difficult struggle of Frank Loyd, halfstarved and seriously ill, sheltering in a series of jungle hideouts. Then, as Mac-Arthur's return approaches, he joins the guerrilla war.

Another dimension is added by an occasional chapter detailing the stateside fears and frustrations of Evelyn, not knowing if her husband was still alive, while she immerses herself in supporting the war effort.

However, the book is more than the combined diaries of the Loyds. It also examines the larger war effort in the

It has been two and a half years since our Philippine Scouts Heritage Society **website** was launched and the number of visitors continues to escalate and will soon total 9,000.



You are invited to visit the PSHS website and share your own thoughts or questions: **www.philippine-scouts.org** Pacific and the involvement of other Americans and Filipinos, many of them Philippine Scouts, in the anti-Japanese guerrilla movement on Luzon. It contains interesting information on commando infiltration teams, both Filipino and American, sent in by submarine to help shore up the resistance movement. It also examines in some detail prison camp conditions and the brutal counter intelligence activities of the dread Japanese *Kempei-tai*.

The book begins with the idyllic tropical existence of the Loyds during nearly a year and a half of pampered and languid duty in peacetime Manila. He was Provost Marshall at Fort McKinley and she taught fourth grade at the base school. American officers in this peacetime army worked half days and spent their evenings socializing with other military families. Training of the Philippine Army also proceeded at a leisurely pace, which would have important ramifications when war broke out.

Notes from Bilibid Prison

Capt. Charles T. "Charlie" Brown, M.D. was stationed at Ft. McKinley before WWII. He served on Bataan in the 12th Medical Battalion (PS) and was assigned to the 14th Regiment of Engineers (PS). Capt. Brown was liberated from Bilibid Prison in 1945. The following slightly edited story was contributed by Mary P. Wood, whose father, Capt. Joseph F. Peters, M.D., serving in the 12th Medical Battalion (PS), Headquarters Company, was a friend of Brown's. Editor

Dad knew Dr. Brown and the funniest thing happened about five months ago [March 2004]. A man named Blair Howell, called and told me this story: He was at an estate sale in San Antonio and bought a good looking brief case with a \$4.00 price tag. Inside he found extensive hand written notes of Capt. Charles T. Brown from a POW camp. There were the poems he used to write "Bars from Bilibid" published in 1947. The poetry is written on scraps of paper, many of

which have orders from China and some dated as early as 1933. There were a few pictures, too. Mr. Howell, a young timeshare salesman, said he wanted some names of former POWs who might have known Dr. Brown. He made several calls and named it the "CTB Collection" and said he wanted to publish or make some money from it. He wanted my help, but I mentioned giving it to a museum because I would think it a treasure. He called me again about three months

ago [roughly in May 2004] and said Sotheby's Auction House had given him a possible sales price quote of \$18,000. to \$20,000. I havent heard anything since, so a few days ago [in Augusts] I sent him an e-mail and inquired if he had sold it. To date I've received no answer. Anyway, I guess Dr Brown's family is gone and all those precious papers went to a garage sale and possibly now to an auction.

July, the Japanese invaded French Indo China and the U.S., Britain and the Netherlands embargoed all trade with Japan, cutting off the flow of oil, rubber and other strategic material needed by the Japanese to sustain their conquest of China. War now appeared inevitable.

Shortly following the devastating Japanese surprise air assaults on Pearl Harbor and the Philippines in early December, a Japanese invasion force landed on Luzon and forced the Filipino and American troops back to defensive positions on Bataan and Corregidor. When Bataan surrendered in early April, Major Loyd was among the small group of American and Filipino military men who escaped to nearby mountains and jungles. Most of these men, including Frank Lovd, spent many months surviving at a subsistence level thanks to the courageous generosity of the local Filipino population.

Eventually Frank and many others would join guerrilla groups, the nucleus of which was organized by American officers put in place by General Mac-Arthur before the surrender. Most of these guerrilla leaders and about half of the 400 Americans who joined them would not survive the war.

In recounting the failures and successes of these guerrilla units, Schaefer also examines the indigenous civilian intelligence network in Manila, which consisted predominantly of upper class Filipinos. Many of these civilian patriots also did not survive the war, as the Japanese successfully infiltrated the movement.

Another interesting feature of the book is a description of the infighting among the various guerrilla leaders, as they vied to assert command over each other and to expand their geographic sway. Although largely ego-driven, this also was the result of a need to claim scant resources in manpower and civilian support. Further complicating the resistance mix, were the Communist-led Hukbalahap, who, when not fighting the Japanese, often clashed violently with American-led guerrilla groups.

Despite the burdens of hunger, disease, scarce resources, infighting and the depredations of the Japanese, sufficient guerrilla forces were mobilized and trained to form a very useful auxiliary force when MacArthur returned to liberate the Philippines. An important component of these guerrilla groups was the Philippine Scouts, superbly-trained Filipino soldiers who comprised the majority of the regular U.S. Army's infantry and cavalry troops in the Philippines. (The Scouts should not be confused with the Philippine Army troops, who were mostly conscripts and not nearly as well trained.) Rallying to the cause in large numbers, the Scouts were crucial in the training of other Filipinos in guerrilla warfare. The Scouts themselves proved as adept at guerrilla warfare as they had been in their heroic defense of Bataan and Corregidor during the early months of the war.

An attractive feature of the book is its map collection which helps the reader visualize where the action took place. Indeed, with its maps, bibliography, extensive endnotes, and lengthy index, this book is a useful reference tool for more serious students of World War II guerrilla warfare on Luzon. As such it is an excellent companion volume to Malcolm Decker's On a Mountainside, reviewed in our last newsletter.

Lifetime member of the GGBAC. Juanito Dalisay died peacefully on January 3, 2005 in Alameda, California. He was 90. Survivors include his wife of 52 years, Maria Bergantinos Dalisay, his children Lucy Dalisay Jackson, Marilyn Godfrey, John Dalisay, Cynthia Marvar, Michael Dalisay, and Jane Kirkman, as well as eight grandchildren. A native of Rosales, Pangasinan, Philippines, Juanito was proud to have served in the US Army from 1941-1965. He survived the Bataan Death March during WWII and POW camp.

Long-time PSHS member Clinton Samuel Jennings died peacefully in San Francisco on October 28, 2004. Clint was born in Long Beach, California in December 1919. He served in the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) from 1937-39. In 1941 he enlisted in the U.S. Army and was shipped to the Philippines. Captured by the Japanese, he spent 31/2 years as a POW in the Philippines and Japan. He retired after 25 years in the Army on a Friday in 1965, and then worked at the Bank of America. He retired again in 1985. He is survived by his wife of 34 years Esther; daughters Andrea Mains and Margaret Cruz and several grandchildren. Besides the Philippine Scouts Heritage Society, Clint was a member of American Defenders of Bataan & Corregidor; Ex-Prisoners of War; The Great War Society; The Retired Officers Assn. and the Reserve Officers Assn. and several other civic and fraternal organizations.

Mario Mocorro, brother of the late first President of the Tacoma Chapter. Mark Mocorro, died in November 2004. He was 74 years old. As his wife Ruth preceded him, his closest surviving family member is his sister, Anita Mocorro,



from Seattle. Mario was a life member of the Chapter, which he joined to honor his brother Mark.

Golden Gate Bay Area Chapter Lifetime member Probo P. Pansov, 92, passed away on October 1, 2004. He was preceded in death by Maria A. Pansoy, his wife of 54 years. He leaves behind his children Fernando, Lazaro, Robert, Condrada, Josephina, Rosario, Paul, Maria Victoria, Maria Elizabeth and Christopher; 20 grandchildren; and 18 great grandchildren. A native of the Philippines, Probo joined the HQ Company, 2nd Battalian, 24th Field Artillery (PS) November 4, 1934 and survived heavy combat and prison camp during WWII. He remained in the post-war U.S. Army and retired after 30 years of service. Mr. Pansoy and his wife spent over 50 years in Albany, California, where they raised their family. He was a member of Bohol Circle, Santo Nino de Cebu, Damas Philippinas and the Knights of Columbus. His love of music led him to join a band in his 70s and 80s in which he sang, and played piano and guitar.

Colonel Morris Loeb Shoss. a former Philippine Scout, was born April 10, 1915 in Houston, Texas and passed

the Philippine Islands, where he served as Executive Officer of Battery C, 91st Coast Artillery (PS), charged with the defense of the Manila and Subic Bay regions. After the surrender, he survived prison camp and the torpedoing of the prison ship transporting him to Japan. He managed to swim ashore from the sinking vessel, was rescued by Filipinos and eventually evacuated by submarine. He retired from the U.S. Army following a distinguished thirty year career. His medals and commendations, include, among others, the Legion of Merit, the Silver Star, two Purple Hearts, one with Oak Leaf Cluster, and two Bronze Stars. one with Valor.

Following his military career, Morris joined the faculty of San Antonio College as chair of the Technical Mathematics Program, where he taught for more than a decade.

Col. Shoss is survived by his son, Dr. Robert G. Shoss of Albany, New York, and daughter and son-in-law, Maurie Lynn and Paul Haas of McAllen, Texas, several grandchildren and a great grandson, as well as many other friends and relatives.

Carlos Yap passed away peacefully in the presence of Rose, his wife of 49 years, on September 21, 2004. Born in Pototan, Iloilo, Philippines May 15, 1922, Carlos enlisted in the Philippine Scouts with one of his younger brothers in 1941 and served with the 12th Quartermaster, which was attached to "B" Company 91st Coast Artillery (PS) on Corregidor. After the surrender, he was a POW in the same camp where his younger brother died a month earlier.

After the war he continued his military service with the U.S. Army and retired in 1961. He and Rose permanently settled in Tacoma, Washington, where he worked for the Boeing Company. Carlos, was a life member of the Philippine Scouts Heritage Society, Tacoma Chapter.

Carlos is survived by his wife, Mrs. Rose Yap of Tacoma, Washington, as well as four children, fourteen grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren.

The final business meeting of the year was held in early December. During the meeting Chapter President Greg Ramos discussed CRSC (Combat related Special Compensation) and passed out application forms for this benefit. There also was an explanation given for disparities in compensation between U.S. Army soldiers and Philippine Scouts during WWII. This sparked a spirited discussion. (This disparity was removed when Scouts joined non-Scout units following the war.) An election was held, which returned the incumbent slate of officers. The evening ended with a Christmas party, which attracted 37, including family members and guests. (This report was submitted by Chapter *Vice President* **Filipe Fernandez**.)

Captain Jose Calugas, Sr. Chapter: In October, the Tacoma chapter placed the Philippine Scout poster exhibit at Pierce College in celebration of World War II week.

In early November Chapter President Jose (Joe) Calugas, Jr. was a guest of LTG Edward Soriano at the General's change of command ceremony. General Soriano, the son of a Philippine Scout, was the first Filipino general in the U.S. Army and remains its highest ranking Filipino officer. He now is retired to Colorado Springs.

The Chapter celebrated Veterans Day in a ceremony at Mountain View Memorial Park in Tacoma and had a Christmas potluck in mid-December.

The Chapter has added ten new lifetime members in 2004, which brings their total to forty, all lifetime members. Sadly, the Chapter also lost two longtime members when **Carlos Yap*** and **Mario Mocorro*** passed away in September and November respectively.

Member Activities

An important objective of this newsletter is the encouragement of our members to raise public awareness of the proud patriotic legacy of the Philippine Scouts. Examples of member's efforts to accomplish this over the last six months follow:

John continues to serve as liaison with the <u>West Point Museum</u> housing a book and memorabilia collection honoring his uncle, Philippine Scout Medal of Honor recipient Lt. Alexander Ramsey Nininger, Jr. He recently donated another sixteen books to the collection.

National Second Vice President Menandro Parazo appeared at several military events and awards ceremonies.

Tacoma Chapter President Joe Calugas' and GGBAC Chapter President Cion Rael's activities are detailed in their chapter reports.

Letter Concerning Major Helmert J. Duisterhof

To whom it may concern:

My name is Bradley Duisterhof-De-Boer and I am the grandson of the late **Major Helmert J. Duisterhof** of the **57th Infantry (PS) Regiment** in the Philippines during WWII. I am contacting you because I came across your web site and email address on the Web site in hopes that you might have known, or know of someone still living who knew my grandfather.

I am doing some research on my family history and have been trying to trace my grandfather's life. The information that I have on him during WWII is sketchy. What I do know are these facts:

He was a Dutch-born American officer assigned to the 57th Infantry (PS) at Ft. McKinley in the Philippines around June 1941. InAugust he was transferred to the Philippine Army.

During the Army's withdraw into Bataan during January 1942, my grandfather led the 2nd Battalion of the 11th Infantry under the command of Col. Glen R. Townsend.

I have come across a couple of accounts of my grandfather's name being mentioned in the published book which I came across on the Internet -US Army in WWII: Fall of the Philippines, which recognized my grandfather's heroics and strategic maneuvering of his battalion during the Bataan defense during the "Battle of the Pockets".

I am also aware that my grandfather survived the "Death March" and made it to Camp O'Donnell, but died soon after from exhaustion, malnutrition and untreated malaria.

I found supporting recollection of this from a story written by former POW and 45 Infantry (PS) veteran/survivor Kary Emerson titled "Guest of the Emperor", which references my grandfather as a survivor of the "Death March" having been the only person he knew who wore his boots the entire time during the march, and was from the "Old School" army. I don't know if Mr. Emerson is still living.

After the war my grandfather's body was recovered in a mass grave containing 365 people. His remains were sent back to the US, and he is buried in Arlington Cemetery.

In 1946 the Army posthumously awarded the Distinguished Service Cross to my grandfather "for extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against the Japanese invasion forces in the Philippine islands on or about 15 February 1942.

I know that it has been over 60 years since the war, and a majority of the veterans who survived are no longer



around. However, since the wonderful age of the internet, I thought I'd give it a try to see if there was anyone who knew or who fought with my grandfather in the Philippines during WWII. I would really appreciate any help that you could give me!

Former Pacific Theater POWs Needed for a Research Study

Background:

A study currently being conducted for the **Department of Veterans Affairs** by the **Hines VA Hospital** in North Chicago suggests several differences between the experiences and outcomes of World War II prisoners of war held captive in the Pacific Theater versus the European Theater. These findings have important implications for the care of former POWs and others who have experienced traumatic events. However, the number of Pacific Theater veterans who have participated in this study is small and more are needed to strengthen these important findings.

Purpose:


The VA is interested in recruiting WWII Pacific Theater POW veterans to gather information about their POW experiences and the effects these experiences have had on their lives. Participants in the study will be mailed a single survey and self-addressed, stamped envelope. The survey takes about 30 minutes to complete. After completing the survey, participants can place the survey in the self-addressed envelope and drop it in the mail. It is also possible to do a videotaped interview at the Hines VA Hospital. A copy of the taped interview will be given to the veteran <u>after the interview</u>. Participation in this study is completely voluntary.

Eligibility:

American veterans who were captured during their tours of duty in WWII and held as prisoners of war in the Pacific Theater are eligible for this study.
